

Seeing Spartanburg in a New Light

October 4, 2016 – April 1, 2017

Seeing Spartanburg in a New Light brings nine temporary art installations to public spaces in ten neighborhoods throughout the city. The project is a partnership among the City of Spartanburg Police and Community Relations Departments, internationally renowned light and digital media artist Erwin Redl, the Chapman Cultural Center, and neighborhood associations in the city of Spartanburg. *Seeing Spartanburg in a New Light* builds on *National Night Out*, an annual event that promotes crime prevention efforts, police-community partnership, and neighborhood camaraderie.

The City of Spartanburg was selected as one of four cities to participate as part of the Bloomberg Philanthropies Public Art Challenge, a new program to support temporary public art projects that celebrate creativity, enhance urban identity, encourage public-private partnerships, and drive economic development.

In late Fall 2015, artist Erwin Redl began collaborating with the city's police department and selected neighborhood associations to design and develop LED light installations that would transform open spaces and create safer, more vibrant neighborhoods.

More about the artist Erwin Redl:

Through my work I explore the invisible. Through my process, I investigate the structures that govern what we perceive; the invisible behind the visible.

In the context of public art this means the artwork has to be immersed in the specific conditions of a site and its social circumstances. With the generous support of Bloomberg Philanthropies, art is able to take a leadership role in building community, placemaking and creating a unique identity through a series of aesthetic interventions.

Each of the nine projects that are a part of *Seeing Spartanburg in a New Light* is tailored to its specific environment and explores artistic opportunities through light-based installations.

This diversity of approaches and manifestations refer back to my interest in the invisible. Different structures lead to different aesthetic explorations and community engagement possibilities. I would like to thank the citizens of Spartanburg. They have been inspirational collaborators in this process.

Artist's bio:

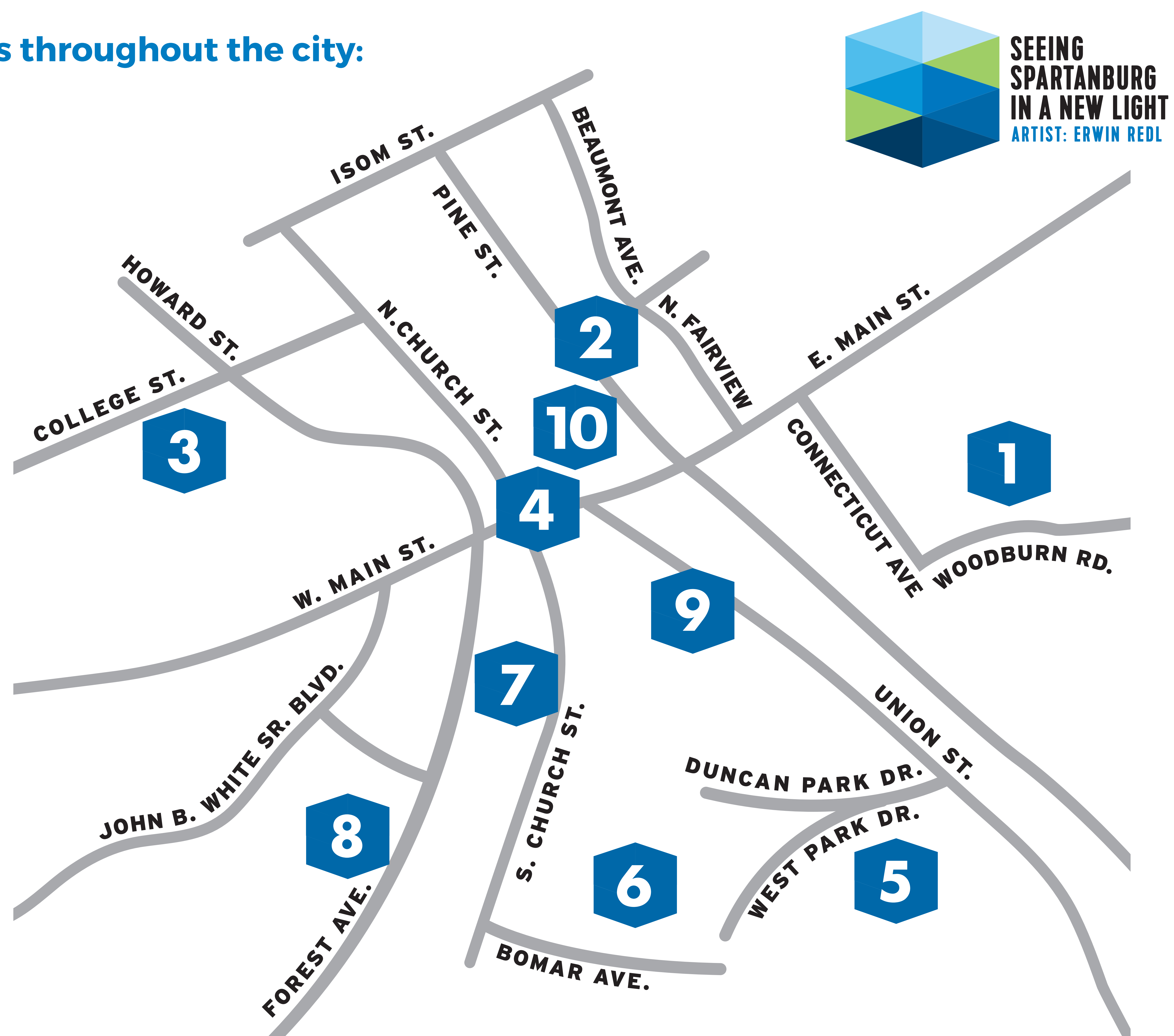
Born in Austria in 1963, Erwin Redl finished his studies at the Vienna Music Academy with two degrees, a BA in Composition and BA in Electronic Music. He was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship for graduate studies in computer art at the School of Visual Arts, in New York City. Redl is inspired by virtual reality and 3D computer modeling and applies it to the real world through his large-scale light installations.

Redl's work is owned by prestigious national and international institutions, among them the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; the Museum of Contemporary Art, San Diego; the Milwaukee Art Museum; and Borusan Contemporary, Istanbul; as well as by private collectors.

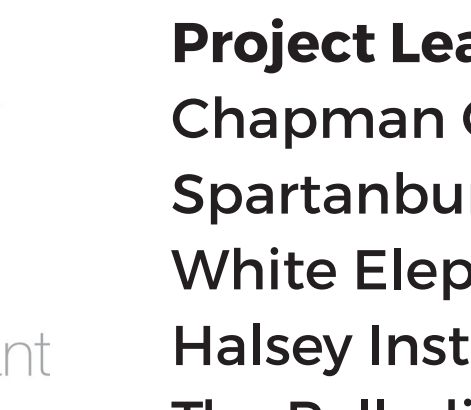
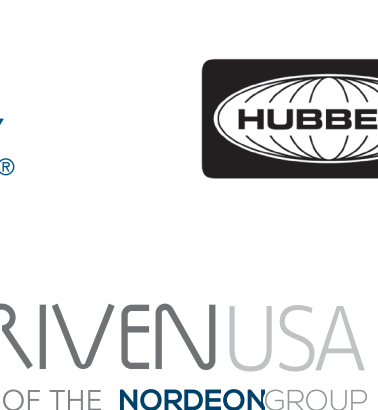

Spartan Mills Smokestacks: *Glow*

Beaumont Mill was built in 1890 on Chinquapin Creek in the city. It was acquired by Spartan Mills in 1941 and closed in 1999. The remaining mill building and smokestack were constructed with locally made brick. They stand at the foot of the “mill hill,” Beaumont Village. The Village was built by the mill to house workers. The mill sold the houses in the 1950’s, mostly to mill workers.

Today the property serves a new purpose, as the administrative offices of Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System. Edifices such as these in the heart of mill villages have historical relevance and serve as symbols of adaptation and change. The community of

Beaumont is more than 125 years old, and still serves as home to many former mill workers and their families.

The artist Erwin Redl has chosen to treat the smokestacks here and in Northside as two synchronized, large-scale canvases for high-powered multicolored lights that bath the surface of the worn bricks. For the artist, these artworks offer a new way of seeing old structures. Redl celebrates the spirit of innovation and imagination with these icons of Spartanburg’s textile past.
